NEW PARAMEDIC SERVICES NOW in FARMINGTON

Paramedic services to Farmington residents are now provided by an independent Farmington City paramedic team. In the past, paramedic services were provided by the Davis County Sheriff's Office, but in the spring of 2019, Davis County cities were informed that this service would be discontinued by the end of 2022. Former Chief Guido Smith (now serving as the Farmington Emergency Management Director and Fire Marshall) mobilized his leadership team to create an independent paramedic

service for Farmington.

Did you know that paramedics are the most highly trained emergency medical providers in the pre-hospital environment? Each paramedic attends 1800 hours of college-level education and, while in school, learns advanced cardiac care and difficult airway procedures. Paramedics are qualified to administer advanced medications and are trained in a host of other skills.

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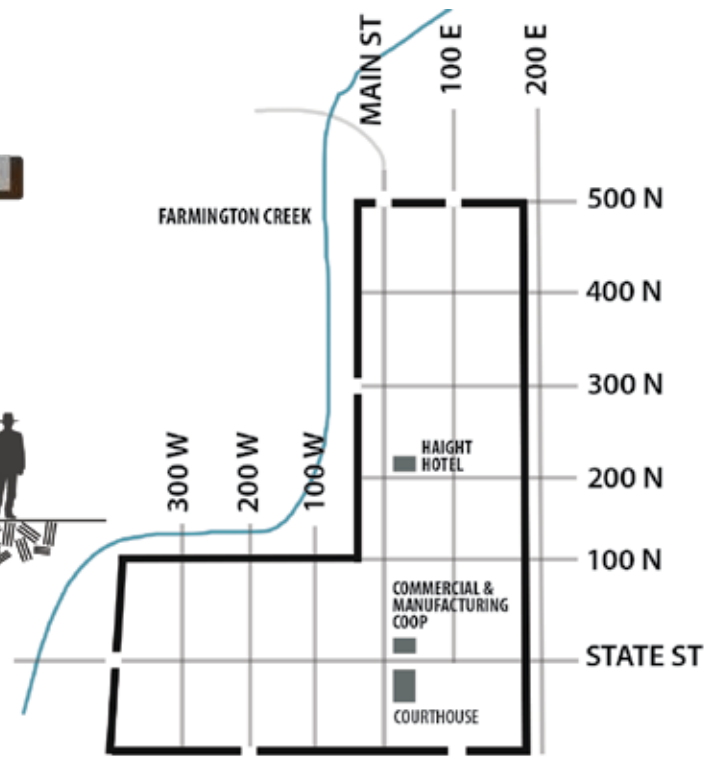
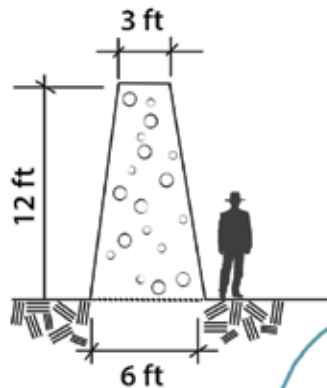

FARMINGTON'S FORT WALL

The history of Farmington is an interesting one. Here is a historical fact that you may not know. In 1853, due to conflicts with Native Americans elsewhere in the state, Governor Brigham Young requested that Farmington residents build a protective fort wall around the city. Construction began the following spring. At that time there were already 67 dwellings inside the planned perimeter. Each able-bodied man was assigned to help construct 115.5 linear feet per building lot. The attached illustration shows the location of the wall that eventually contained 112 city lots. The fort wall was made of mud and timber planks and was between twelve and fourteen feet tall with a base that was six feet



wide. The average width of the top of the wall was 3 feet. The builders left guarded entrances for passage into the city. The courthouse and much of Clark Lane were inside its boundaries. Eventually, as the city expanded, the wall became useless and succumbed to its fate. As far as we know, no part

of the wall remains.

And now you know.

5 TIPS FOR WHOLE HOME SAFETY



INSTALL SMOKE AND CO ALARMS

Smoke and carbon monoxide (CO) alarms provide an early warning in the event of an emergency. Alarms should be installed on every level and in every bedroom for whole home protection. Combination smoke and CO alarm systems provide 2-in-1 protection against smoke and carbon monoxide, saving space on your wall as well as installation time.

BE PREPARED WITH FIRE EXTINGUISHERS

Fire extinguishers can help stop a small fire from growing larger and causing more damage to your house. Be sure to have a fire extinguisher or EZ Fire Extinguishing Spray on every level of your home, as well as in the kitchen and garage. It is also important that you know how to use a fire extinguisher before ever having to do so. A helpful acronym is P.A.S.S. Pull the pin, Aim the nozzle at the base of the fire, Squeeze the trigger, and Sweep from side to side.

PLAN AND PRACTICE YOUR EMERGENCY SAFETY ROUTE WITH YOUR FAMILY

In the event of a home emergency, having an escape plan can help keep your family safe. Your safety plan should include two exits out of every bedroom and a designated meeting spot a safe distance from your house (like the mailbox or neighbor's house). Practice and review your emergency safety escape plan with the whole family, especially children, at least twice a year to be sure everyone remembers the plan.

TEST AND MAINTAIN YOUR ALARM SYSTEMS

Test the smoke and CO alarms in your house monthly to ensure they are working properly. If you have a battery-powered alarm, change the batteries every six months to make sure your family is safe. Basic maintenance of your alarms includes cleaning them at least once a month. To clean, gently vacuum the outside of the alarm using your household vacuum's soft brush attachment. A can of clean compressed air may also be used. Never use water, cleaners, or solvents because they can damage the alarm. If the smoke or CO alarm in your house becomes contaminated by excessive dirt, dust, or grime, and cannot be cleaned, you should replace the alarm with a new one.

REPLACE YOUR ALARMS AFTER 10 YEARS

Smoke and CO alarm systems do not last forever and should be replaced at least 10 years from the manufacture date. The manufacture date can be found on the back of the alarm. When replacing, upgrade outdated alarms to 10-year sealed battery alarms to eliminate the need for battery replacements for the life of the alarm. An end-of-life warning will let you know when the alarms need to be replaced.

MAKING YOUR COMMUTE EASIER

The Utah Transit Authority, at the request of Farmington City officials, is adding trips to the public trolley shuttle bus. The timing of these trips will accommodate all residents, but particularly employees of Farmington City, Davis County and Davis School District.

The trolley will leave the Frontrunner Station at 7:45 and 8:47 in the morning, getting to State and Main in Farmington at 7:56 and 8:58 am. Evening shuttles will leave State and Main at 4:13 and 5:12 pm, arriving at the Farmington Frontrunner at 4:27 and 5:26. New trips will meet up conveniently with either the northbound or southbound train in the morning and evening. Changes will be in effect beginning April 17, 2022.

The trolley will run extended late-night trips while Lagoon is open. Monday through Thursday, the trolley will run until 10:00 pm and will run until 11:00 pm on Fridays. In May, the trolley will run until 10:00 pm on Saturdays, but in June through August, the trolley will run until 10:52 pm on Saturdays.

Paramedic Services continued

Having paramedic services provided locally positively impacts Farmington residents by improving access to the highest level of emergency care when the need to call 911 arises. The Davis County Sheriff's Office has provided excellent paramedic-level care; however, it has not been uncommon to get responders from as far north as Clinton, as far south as North Salt Lake, and as far west as Antelope Island. Now that Farmington City has its own in-house

paramedic responders, citizens are provided faster response times, which is critical when seconds count in life-and-death emergencies.

Now that services are provided locally, paramedics may respond in a paramedic rescue vehicle rather than in an ambulance or fire engine. This is in place to allow for the fastest response times, while facilitating the ability to respond to multiple calls throughout the city.

If you happen to see the paramedic rescue vehicle around Farmington, feel free to stop by, say hello, and meet the paramedics. Paramedics are excited to provide the highest level of pre-hospital care to the residents of Farmington and their visitors. In conjunction with Farmington Fire Department's mission statement, the paramedic team members are "Proud Protectors of Your Life and Property—since 1907." 🌲
