WATER CONSERVATION FARMINGTON CITY PARK IRRIGATION

Farmington City has been proactive in water conservation efforts going all the way back to the days when the Great Salt Lake was much greater. The parks department started using smart controllers in 2002. Now, almost twenty years later, upgrades are being made to one of the most advanced irrigation controllers available, one which allows for input of parameters such as plant type, soil type, sprinkler precipitation rate, slope percentage and root depth. The software takes this information, along with high-resolution weather data, and schedules irrigation to give the plant just the right amount of water. Due to the drought and water restrictions, parks personnel have reduced watering schedules substantially and increased mowing height at all city properties. Grounds won't look the way we'd all like them to, but it's the prudent action considering circumstances. The parks department has and will continue to water some areas of Regional Park a little more

than others due to the age of the grass and the recreation programs they need to accommodate. The same holds true for the cemetery, due to the sensitivity of the grounds. Citizens may observe some parks being watered nearly every night, but it's not the same zones running every night. You may observe the same zone run three or four times in one cycle. This is to prevent runoff and maximize soil percolation. You may also see sprinklers running during the day. This is typically the maintenance staff checking for broken or out-of-adjustment heads and general inefficiencies. However, some water waste is inevitable due to heads that are broken or out of adjustment and broken lines. Often, parks users are the first to spot an issue. If you see an issue, please report water waste by going to the farmington.utah.gov > online services > provide feedback.
