Farmington City will pick up natural Christmas trees on Saturday, January 14th. To take advantage of this service, here's what you need to do:

- Place trees on the curb by 6:00 am on January 14th. Crews will pass through neighborhoods once.
- Cut trees into 6-foot lengths.
- Clear snow away so that trees are on the surface and visible.

Collected trees are used to make mulch. Flocked trees cannot be used and will not be picked up.



WINTER ORDINANCES

City ordinances state that from November 15 through February 28, no vehicle of any kind may be parked in the street right-of-way from 1:00am to 7:00am. Traffic citations will be issued to violators.
