

The great service of collecting yard debris from residences, provided by Farmington City each spring, will again be offered in 2022. Trimming deadwood and overgrowth from yards not only beautifies the city, but also protects it against wildfire.

Because the number of homes in Farmington continues to increase, modifications have been made to spring cleanup parameters. Full dump truck loads can no longer be collected from each residence. Please read carefully and comply with the following:

- Collection is solely for residential limbs and branches.
- Limbs and branches must be a <u>width of no more than 8 inches</u> and cut to a <u>length no longer</u> than 4 feet.
- Limbs and branches must be stacked at the curb in a *pile no larger than 8 feet long, 4 feet wide,* and 4 feet high. Stacking limbs in the same direction allows for more volume in the pile.
- Material must be placed at the curb before beginning collection day.
- Collection <u>trucks will only drive by your home ONCE</u>.
- No bags or boxes.
- Leaves can be left in piles.

Materials collected will be mulched at the Central Davis Sewer District Treatment Plant.


Street sweeping will be done after spring cleanup is completed. Because they will plug the vacuum hose, the sweeper cannot pick up limbs or twigs over 6 inches long.

• After the cleanup is complete, please rake the limbs and twigs from your gutter and throw them in your garbage can. This will help the street sweeper be more efficient.

RETIRED Parks & Recreation Director NEIL MILLER

Neil Miller is such an integral part of Farmington's parks and recreation community that it's hard to imagine either without him. But, at the end of January, Neil retired and Colby Thackeray, a 25-year employee, stepped into the position.

Recreation has been a life-long love for Neil. He started reffing ball games for Plain City when he was only fourteen and gravitated right back to recreation when he returned from serving an LDS mission, taking a job as a recreation coordinator.

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In 1993, Neil was hired as Farmington's parks superintendent, which was a part of the public works department. "I was the only full-time parks guy, along with a couple of seasonal workers, to take care of nine green spaces." After sixteen years as superintendent, Neil was named Farmington's first parks and recreation director. That job came with new experiences and challenges for Neil—things like the Miss Farmington Pageant, community theater, and Festival Days. But he has always been one to take on assignments with positivity and make them work. "I surrounded myself with the best. I've never wanted to fly solo. Anything that Neil Miller did right was because he was part of a team."

Neil has worked with five mayors: Greg Bell, David Connors, Scott Harbertson, James Talbot, and Brett Anderson, "To rub shoulders with these guys, well, they're just the best of the best. I told myself to pay attention and learn from them." He also worked with three city managers: Max Forbush, David Millheim, and Shane Pace.

In the last decade, technology has become a significant factor in successful parks and recreation administration, and it was a turning point for Neil. "I was told that if I wanted to be successful in the future, I'd better learn to use computers. We can now control so many things—irrigation systems, lights, heat, sound systems—from our phones. I'm glad I took that advice and made the decision to get on board with it."

There have been many significant changes in Farmington over Neil's career. When he started in 1993, the city had 9 grass areas, such as small parks and entrance parks. Now there are 37. There were 33 acres, including the cemetery. Now the parks department maintains 174 acres; 9 parks grew to 37.

"The highlight of my career is the Farmington gymnasium and sports-plex. That is such a great facility, and it'll be around for a hundred years. I'm really proud of the work we did there."



The love of travel runs a close second to Neil's love of recreation. He and his wife, Melanie, plan trips years ahead and have made wonderful memories with family and friends. They have organized a trip for twenty-five family members (pictured above) to Puerto Vallarta. "It takes a lot of juggling to get that many people together and I credit my wife with that. It'll be the experience of a lifetime."

"I have made so many friendships, so many meaningful relationships with people who have impacted my life. The list is a mile long. I'm sure I'll still run into a lot of you. It's been an incredible experience to be part of the change and growth of Farmington. I think maintaining the quality of life, not only in recreation, but across the board, will be the future challenge of the city—to keep the way of life that the people of Farmington deserve. Thank you everyone for the love. I have tons of great memories."


Farmington City's Newest City Council Member

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
