NEED to DRAIN your SWIMMING POOL or HOT TUR?

There's a *Right* and *Wrong* Way

Water from swimming pools and hot tubs contains high levels of chlorine, bromine and other chemicals that can harm the environment when drained improperly. Chlorinated water can percolate down through the soil, inhibit plant growth, and contaminate groundwater. It can also enter the storm drain system, which is not connected to the treatment plant and flows directly to our creeks and the Great Salt Lake.

For complete information about best practices, go to the Farmington City website, <u>farmington.utah.gov</u>. But meanwhile, here's an encapsulated guide.

Discharge chlorinated water from pools and hot tubs to the sanitary sewer. Permission must be obtained from Central Davis Sewer District.

If discharging to a sanitary sewer is not possible, dechlorinated water (see below) from pools and hot tubs may be discharged slowly (to avoid runoff) to a vegetated landscape.

Dechlorinated water is an allowable discharge to the storm drain system, but authorization must be granted by Farmington City.

Dechlorination of pool water can be accomplished by following these steps:

stop adding chlorine

leave water in the pool for a week or longer to allow chlorine to dissipate

measure chlorine levels to ensure the pH range is within 8.5–9.0. Even at low concentrations, chlorine is harmful to aquatic life.

discharge water slowly to prevent erosion

filter solids (algae, sediment, leaves, etc.) before discharging

e nsure water does not flow onto someone else's property



"The world kind of worries me. It's kind of rough right now," Ella Smith admitted as we discussed current events. She added, "But there are always good things going on, and it's important to look at those too." Lately Ella and her sisters Kayt and Hazel have been planning one of those "good things."

Originally from Rexburg, Idaho, the Smith family moved to Farmington last summer. Like all changes, their move proved to be quite an adjustment, with obstacles and successes along the way. Hazel liked her fourth-grade teacher at Knowlton, yet it took a while for her to adapt to how the school was managed. Ella enjoyed her art class at Farmington Junior High, yet, like most young teens, struggled to find friends. Kayt was grateful for a fresh start at Farmington High, where she could interact with a wider diversity of peers than at her previous school, yet she soon found it difficult to balance the demands of her teachers with her after-school activities.

Thankfully, with the support of their parents, the Smith girls have settled in here, and perhaps their experience as newcomers gave them a little more empathy than they otherwise would have gained. When asked what she wished adults knew about kids, Kayt replied that many fellow students battle the same issue most adults also struggle to navigate: work-life balance.

"Most kids I know are trying to do well

in school and also have a job or family stuff and extracurriculars, and they are trying to balance that and trying to get enough sleep." She said, "School is hard, and making the transition between how you are in freshman year to being a senior and then become an adult—that's difficult. I wish it was more normal to say things like 'I struggle with anxiety' or more accepting to say 'I didn't finish my homework so I could sleep' or admit sometimes we are

not able to get it all done. We sometimes have to make sacrifices."

Recently the family decided to visit an old friend from Rexburg who is an economics professor at BYU-Idaho. while he is on sabbatical in his home country of Ecuador. As they planned the trip, the girls thought to include a service project. After their parents coordinated with the country's welfare system, Kayt, Ella, and Hazel raised funds by selling baked goods and doing yardwork in

their neighborhood, so they could buy necessities for a struggling village. To their surprise, they raised more than double their goal.

A final message from the Smith girls: "Just believe in kids, that they're going to be good. Maybe they messed up or they haven't passed their tests yet, but they all need encouragement and understanding and support."

Because the beautiful sycamore and ash trees along State and Main streets are an integral part of our city's identity and a point of pride for us all, Farmington City provides the service of picking up leaves in the following areas:

- Main Street from 100 S to 500 N
- State Street from 400 W to 300 E
- 200 W from State to 200 S
- **400** N from Main to 100 E

The sweeper will be in these areas on a regular basis. <u>Limbs and twigs</u> <u>cannot be picked up</u>. Please do not put these types of materials at the curb. They plug the vacuum hose.

If you do not live in the areas listed above, you are responsible to collect and dispose of the leaves on your property. Please do not put your leaves in the street.

City ordinances state that from <u>November 15 through February 28</u>, no vehicle of any kind may be parked in the street right-of-way from 1:00am to 7:00am. Traffic citations will be issued to violators.
