



Here we are already into March. This month's edition of the Blue Blog will focus on stats from January 2024 with 2023 in parentheses for comparative purposes.

In total the police responded 1063 calls for service (down from 1153 in January of 2023) auto accident—49 (37) traffic stops—456 (394) adult and/or juvenile arrests—11 (23)

Here are a couple of interesting incidents Farmington Police dealt with in January:

On January 6th at about 11:55 pm, Officer Pence stopped out on a vehicle that was pulled to the side of the road with hazard lights flashing. The location of the incident was at the northbound HWY 89 off-ramp at Main Street. During the encounter Officer Pence learned that the vehicle was uninsured and impounded the vehicle. Pursuant to impounding the vehicle, Officer Pence conducted an inventory of the contents of the car, during which he observed several items that he believed were

illegal drugs and drug paraphernalia. This incident is an excellent example of an officer conducting routine patrol functions, and as a result, heroin, methamphetamine, and drug paraphernalia was taken out of the community. Great job, Officer Pence.

On January 17th at about 5:00 pm, Sergeant Jacobson, along with several other Farmington officers and officers from other agencies, responded to a call involving a theft at Best Buy. A witness observed three males stealing products from the Best Buy store in Farmington. The suspects got into a white Cadillac and left the area. The witness followed the Cadillac and was able to provide dispatch with a current location which was then relayed to responding officers. Sergeant Jacobson was able to stop the suspect vehicle at about 70 West 1150 South in Farmington. Three of the occupants fled on foot from the vehicle while Sergeant Jacobson was able to take the driver into custody. The perimeter of the area was established by other responding officers.

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THE CITYWIDE CLEANUP begins on April 8th and will be completed April 19th.

Residential cleanup rules are as follows:

> RESIDENTIAL LIMBS AND **BRANCHES ONLY**

Maximum branch size is 8 inches in diameter and 4 feet in length.



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Spring Cleanup continued

PILE SIZE MAY NOT EXCEED

8 feet long, 4 feet wide and 4 feet high. Only ONE pile per residence will be picked up.

Limbs stacked in the same direction allow for increased volume in the pile.

Materials must be placed at the curb BEFORE beginning collection day. Collection trucks will ONLY drive by each residence ONCE.

No rootballs or stumps, leaves or pine needles will be picked up.

RULES WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED

Citywide Collection Schedule: Monday, April 8th

All debris must be at the curb before this date. The city will not be split in half this year. The cleanup will be completed by April 19, 2024.

A street sweeper will pass through neighborhoods after the cleanup is completed. The sweeper cannot pick up limbs or twigs over 6 inches long because they plug the vacuum hose. Once cleanup crews have finished in front of your residence, please rake up the limbs and twigs in your gutter and throw them in your garbage can. This will help the sweeper be more efficient.

In an ongoing effort to maintain the dignity and beauty of Farmington's cemetery, *cleanup of the cemetery will begin on March 1st*. This upkeep is vital for preserving the grounds and protecting the memory of those interred and the natural beauty of the surroundings. Your cooperation is kindly requested as this work is respectfully accomplished.

All dead flowers will be removed regardless of placement.

Artificial flowers and decorations not placed in vases integral to upright markers (i.e., those located above the marker base) will be removed. This policy helps prevent damage to city maintenance equipment and ensures the cemetery remains neat and well-kept.

It is understood that items are often placed with love and remembrance. City crews carefully pay attention to birth dates, as well as death dates, and strive to leave recently placed items at the gravesite.

An organized search for the three outstanding subjects began. Thankfully, due to observant residents in the area, the three suspects were apprehended quickly while they were attempting to gain entry to a home in the area by giving the homeowner a story about needing to call their mother because they had just been robbed.

Fortunately, no one was hurt during this incident, and all four suspects were either booked into jail or released to their parents, and ultimately charged with felony retail theft; possession of marijuana; possession of drug paraphernalia; possession of a dangerous weapon; contributing to the delinquency of a minor; and possession of tobacco by a minor. Sergeant Jacobson did an excellent job by arriving in the area quickly and providing valuable information to responding officers. We are very thankful for the help from observant and helpful witnesses. It was a great resolution to a potentially dangerous situation.
