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# NOTICE OF SEWER SERVICES RATE INCREASE

Effective July 1st, the rate for sewer services will increase by \$10.00 per month. This rate increase, imposed by the Central Davis Sewer, accounts for rising chemical costs associated with state-mandated regulations, increased cost for biosolids handling due to loss of property for roads, ongoing operations and maintenance, and financial stability and capital improvement. # LANDSCAPE LAWN EXCHANGE PROGRAM

Farmington residents qualify for lawn replacement incentives of \$2.50 per square foot. This is offered for any area of a yard. The program requires taking out lawn and replacing it with water-wise plants and drip systems. Plant requirements are based on the areas being changed, but plants are required in all areas outside of the park strip. 

In February, several Farmington Fire employees, along with representatives from neighboring agencies, participated in an emergency drone class geared toward receiving the 14 CFR USA pilot certification. In the event of a search and rescue or large fire, the city will have access to multiple unmanned aircraft pilots with the ability to navigate broader areas and provide quicker response times for first responders.

Over the past few weeks, Farmington Fire has hosted several Weber State University student ride-alongs as part of their EMT programs. With a ride-along, students are given an opportunity to work with seasoned medical professionals, gaining new insight and hands-on training for their future careers. The partnership has been very successful. Many of the students are also actively pursuing their Firefighter 1 and 2 Certifications.

### **INTERESTING INCIDENT:**

On March 13, at about 11:30 pm, Officer White stopped a vehicle in the vicinity of Smith's grocery store because the vehicle did not have a license plate visibly affixed to the rear of the car. Upon making contact with the driver, Officer White was told the driver did not have a driver's license or vehicle insurance. He was told none of the occupants of the car had a valid driver's license.

During the course of the traffic stop it was discovered the driver of the vehicle

had active warrants for his arrest. In plain view to officers was drug paraphernalia. Ultimately, all occupants of the vehicle were arrested. Several bags of marijuana were located in the car, as well as a loaded handgun. An NCIC check of the handgun revealed that it was stolen. During the investigation it was discovered one of the occupants was unlawfully in possession of someone else's credit card.

This case is another example of excellent police work by Officer White. The next time you are tempted to be annoyed by officers making traffic stops for what might seem trivial, remember that often times those routine traffic stops lead to the removal of guns, drugs, and people from our community that otherwise might do us harm.

We made it through another winter, and spring seems like it has finally decided to stay.

My message this month would be to all of the high school-age drivers. **PLEASE BE GAREFUL!**Sunshine and warmer weather seem to put an extra skip in our step. Don't let this cause you to be careless or reckless on the roadways and turn exciting, memorable events like graduation, trips, and sporting events into tragic events. I don't want to be a downer, but please be safe in all of your upcoming activities.
