



Farmington City, along with Stapp Construction, is performing a long-overdue and much needed water line improvement project along Main street from State Street to 145 W 600 N. This project will replace a 4" cast water main that has been in service since the late 1920s. It will be replaced with a new 12" C900 plastic line, which will greatly increase fire flow and general water transmission within the system.

The project should be completed by the end of May, at which time UDOT will overlay the street with asphalt. It will be broken down in sections starting at State Street and

moving north. This will involve partial and full road closures, detours, planned water outages, and unplanned emergency water outages.

The project will be a very technical and difficult one that will have a major impact on those people who live in the area.

Public Works will be as open and informative as possible with water shut off notices, social media posts and project updates on the city website, along with information boards posted around the project area. 
