

Fallen Leaf Collection

As leaves continue to fall, remember that you are responsible to collect and dispose of the leaves on your property.

ONLY leaves from the street trees along State and Main streets are eligible for city pickup. All other homes and all other fallen leaves are the responsibility of the homeowner. PLEASE DO NOT blow these leaves into the street or park strip. Instead, bag and throw away leaves or take them to the landfill.

FOR THOSE WHO LIVE ALONG STATE & MAIN STREETS: Main Street from 100 S to 500 N State Street from 400 W to 300 E 200 W from State to 200 S 400 N from Main to 100 E

The city sweeper will come by on a regular basis, at least 1–2 times per week, from October through December. Please only put *leaves* out, as limbs and twigs cannot be picked up and will clog the hose.

COMMERCIAL, MOBILE, AND IN-HOME DAYCARE/ PRESCHOOL BUSINESSES IN FARMINGTON CITY

Business licenses expire on
December 31st and must be renewed
annually. Renewal notices are sent via
Civic Review to the email on file about
45 days before expiration (i.e. midNovember). Make sure your contact
information is current and that Civic
Review emails are not blocked by your
spam filter. We do not send paper
renewals. You may call us at the
number listed in this article to verify or
change the email on file.

During renewal, we will verify: business name registration, TAP registration, and any required inspections/certifications. Once the renewal is reviewed and approved, and payment submitted, you can print your license at your own convenience.

Verifying your information and renewing before the December 31st deadline will ensure you are not subject to late fees. For questions or to update your email, contact the Community Development Office at 801–939–9215 or at crowe@farmington.utah.gov.





WINTER PARKING

City ordinances state that beginning November 15th through the end of February, no vehicle of any kind may be parked in the street right-of-way from 1:00-7:00am. Traffic citations will be issued to violators.

Within 48 hours after snowfall stops, citizens are required to remove snow from the public sidewalks fronting their property. More snow removal information is available on the city website.
