SKATE PARK/PUMP TRACK

We are excited to begin 2026 with the official launch of our new guiding philosophy and principles at the police department. As members of the Farmington Police Department, we believe that greatness is built through consistency and the habits we choose to live by each day. 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MAIN STREET

The Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT), in partnership with Farmington City, is undertaking improvements along Main Street between Park Lane and Shepard Lane. The project includes minor roadway widening, installation of curbing, and construction of new sidewalks.

A contractor has been selected, and utility relocation activities are currently underway. As a result, temporary traffic control measures—including flagging operations—will be in place throughout the winter months. Storm drain installation is scheduled along Park Lane, on and off site, through December.

Construction operations will be suspended the last week of December until late in February. Residents should anticipate traffic delays and significant construction activity within the project area throughout 2026.

I-15 WIDENING

UDOT is advancing the process of selecting a design-builder for the I-15 widening project. This initiative will expand I-15 from North Salt Lake to Park Lane, enhancing capacity and improving traffic flow.

The project team is currently engaged in pre-design activities, right-of-way acquisition, and early construction work in select areas. Planned improvements include the addition of new lanes and the replacement of bridges at Glovers Lane, State Street, and the 200 West interchange.

Design efforts will continue throughout 2026, with major construction scheduled to begin in 2027. To mitigate anticipated traffic congestion during construction, UDOT will also widen Legacy Highway by adding one lane in 2026. We will be great listeners who are open to feedback and the possibility of learning from everyone. We will confidently serve with gratitude and eliminate any sense of entitlement by expressing appreciation often.

ACCOUNTABLE

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BUSINESS LICENSE RENEWAL NOTICE

The following business licenses expired on December 31:

COMMERCIAL, MOBILE, AND DAYCARE/PRESCHOOL

To renew, please access your portal using the email sent via Civic Review in mid-November. If you did not receive this email, contact our office promptly. There have also been several reminders prior to this expiration date sent via email.

IMPORTANT: Licenses include a short grace period, but late fees will begin accruing on February 1st. Failure to renew may result in your license being inactivated, as well as additional penalties outlined in city code. If your business has closed since your last renewal, please submit a closure request when you receive the email or contact Farmington City immediately to avoid renewal charges.

Please note that your renewal is not complete when you click "Submit." After approval, you must pay your fee and will then be prompted to print your license at your convenience.

NOTE: Home occupation licenses expire one year from the date of issuance. This notice applies only to the license types listed above.

HELPFUL TIP: To ensure a smooth renewal process, verify that your business name/DBA is active with the State of Utah Business Registration, and confirm that your TAP number is valid for Farmington City if you collect sales tax (e.g., 9999999999999-STC, location 06017).

WATER TANK

We are working on our new water tank. When completed, Farmington will be well-positioned to handle the culinary water needs of this city for years and years to come.

GREEN WASTE

We will be rolling out a green waste recycling program. It is opt-in, which means it is optional. Remember, all household waste is literally loaded into large semitrucks and hauled about 100 miles away. We pay by the pound for our waste management. By recycling our green waste, we not only reduce the tonnage of waste we ship to the landfill, but we prolong the life of the landfill by avoiding the introduction of massive amounts of biodegradable green waste into our normal household waste. A very large portion of our waste tonnage between May and October is green waste. The city will receive a rebate from Wasatch Integrated (the Davis County waste management district) for the green waste and recycling that we divert from the landfill. More details about green waste recycling will come this spring. By the way, if someone floats the rumor that the recycled materials are not actually recycled, that is flat-out wrong. In 2025, Wasatch Integrated recycled about 407 tons of paper, 337 tons of PET (plastic #1), 199 tons of HDPE (plastic #2), 251 tons of steel, 268 tons of aluminum, and, thanks to Amazon, 5,284 tons of cardboard. Wasatch Integrated received about \$1,385,895 in compensation for the recyclables recovered from the cities that recycle. It actually pays to recycle. Let's keep doing it.
