New ALL WHEELS PARK COMING TO FARMINGTON

Debuting in 1996, Farmington had the first public concrete skate park in Utah. Sadly, while being a part of Utah history, the sport's use of the park has evolved, making the park largely obsolete. The space presently being occupied by the park is also needed by UDOT for the widening expansion of I-15 (starting construction in 2027).

In 2025, the city hired the American Ramp Company, based in Joplin, Missouri, to design a park that will meet today's demand for action sports. Around that time, an opportunity presented itself to make the park "uniquely Farmington-esque" (which might be an understatement).

In January 2026, on one of the only snow days of that winter, a group of Farmington officials and representatives from Lagoon Amusement Park met at the site of the newly decommissioned JetStar2. It was during that visit that Farmington asked the question, "So guys, do you think you can give us the whole rollercoaster?"

The JetStar2 was a legendary steel roller coaster designed by Anton Schwarzkopf. It debuted at the World's Fair Expo '74 in Spokane, Washington, before moving here to Farmington at Lagoon, where it operated from April of 1976, until it permanently closed in November of 2025. Farmington and Lagoon are synonymous to most Utahns and Idahoans, and so when the opportunity came up to bring a part of the iconic amusement park into our new all-wheels park, we jumped at the chance. Components of the JetStar2 will be reborn as recognizable and rideable features of the new all-wheels park. Unlike skate parks of the past, including our own, this new park will be available for all wheels—scooters, wheelchairs, bikes (BMX and MTB), skateboards, rollerblades, and roller skates. Imagine riding your mountain bike, wheelchair, or other wheels of choice on a real rollercoaster. As your skills grow and permit, you can jump over the Jetstar2 carts or grind the trucks of your skateboard on a piece of 1970 German rollercoaster

steel that has carried millions of riders across its surface during the hot Farmington summer months for 50 years!

In the late Spring of 2026, Farmington was awarded a \$1 million grant from the Utah Office of Outdoor Recreation (UORG) for park construction. The remaining funds will come from UDOT's purchase of the land they need for the expansion of the interstate. The remaining balance will be paid through park impact fees paid at the issuance of residential building permits and, finally, the Recreation, Arts, and Park Fund.

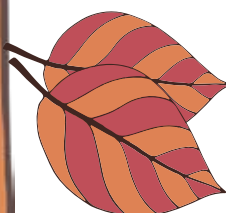

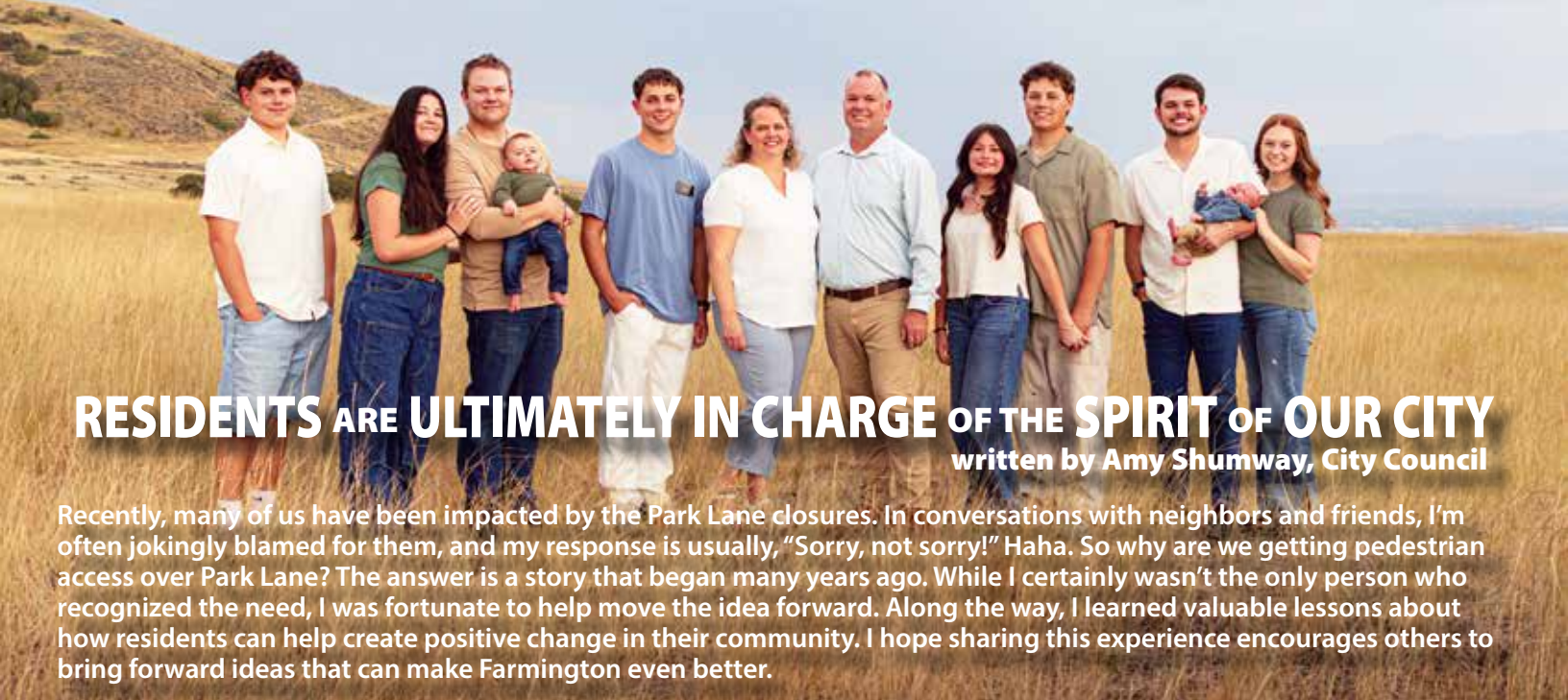

RESIDENTS ARE ULTIMATELY IN CHARGE OF THE SPIRIT OF OUR CITY

Recently, many of us have been impacted by the Park Lane closures. In conversations with neighbors and friends, I'm often jokingly blamed for them, and my response is usually, "Sorry, not sorry!" Haha. So why are we getting pedestrian access over Park Lane? The answer is a story that began many years ago. While I certainly wasn't the only person who recognized the need, I was fortunate to help move the idea forward. Along the way, I learned valuable lessons about how residents can help create positive change in their community. I hope sharing this experience encourages others to bring forward ideas that can make Farmington even better.

Back in the summer of 2012, my boys and I set a goal to ride 100 miles. That might not seem like a lot, but my boys' ages were 10, 8, 6, 4, and 1 at the time. So it wasn't a small task. We live by Oakridge Country Club, so getting to the family-friendly bike trails on the west side was a big feat. I didn't feel comfortable riding over the old Shepard Lane overpass, even though we did it once or twice. That experience got me thinking about how amazing it would be to have pedestrian access over Park Lane. I started talking to neighbors, and all seemed to agree it was needed, especially to connect FrontRunner and Station Park with Lagoon. I had no idea what to do, so I started asking questions of city, county, and state representatives who would listen. I collected 400 signatures from neighbors and local bike users and approached the city with my ideas.

I'll be honest, I had no idea how the city runs or how projects like this get started. I didn't know what a city manager did and had never attended a city council or planning commission meeting. Dave Millheim, city manager at the time, asked me to present my ideas to the planning commission. From there, the ball started rolling—very slowly. I joined the trails committee, which helped me better understand city government and key community leaders. I also became involved politically as a state and county delegate and later participated in an active transportation study for Kaysville and Farmington. The study identified barriers for bike and pedestrian users and helped secure funding for projects that made our city safer.

In the meantime, I started a Facebook page called Build the Bridge. It helped raise awareness and get people talking about the project. I posted updates and progress reports. At times it was slow and painful, but I stayed persistent. When my boys wanted to have a lemonade stand, we decided instead to bake and sell homemade bread. We donated \$1 from every loaf sold to Build the Bridge. It became a game, and our fastest time was selling 15 loaves in 35

minutes. Over a couple of years, we sold 1,000 loaves and presented the city with a check as seed money for the project. We knew we could never fund it ourselves, but we kept it in the public eye and showed how much the community wanted it. A local news station even featured our efforts.

After a couple more years of meetings with engineers and support from President Stuart Adams, Farmington City staff, and UDOT, the project was connected with the new North Station Interchange and funding was finally secured.

Now comes the part everyone recognizes: the construction of the bridge. The pedestrian bridge has seemed to take a long time,

but the North Station Interchange needed to open before Park Lane could be closed for tunnel construction. Now the tunnel is in and progress is moving more quickly. We're excited to have the project finished

this fall and enjoy the benefits of this new connection to trails throughout Farmington.

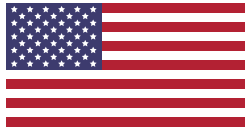
So why do I share this experience? I was an ordinary mother and wife raising five boys. Every day felt like survival mode. I took an idea and ran with it. Many small steps have led to this project

and a more connected city. I encourage anyone with a great idea to bring it forward. You never know what can happen. Anyone in the community can make a positive difference. We as residents are ultimately responsible for the spirit of our city. How we act and what we do can have a profound impact on our own lives and on those around us. One of my favorite quotes is from Brad Wilcox: "Don't let the world change you when you were born to change the world." The world is a big place, but let's start in our own homes, neighborhoods, and online by being a little kinder and working a little harder to make Farmington an even better place to live.
